**Fall Quarterly Meeting
Sunday, November 22**

Our Fall meeting will be held on Sunday, November 22, 2009 at 2 p.m. in Our Lady of Victory Parish Center on Roxbury Road, Marble Cliff.

The program will be a presentation of "Columbus Catholic Funeral Homes: A Sharing of Family Stories." Participants will include Bob Ryan of Egan-Ryan; Anthony Tiberi of Maeder-Quint-Tiberi; Anna Quint Treboni and Anthony Treboni of John Quint-Treboni; and Maryellen O'Shaughnessy of O'Shaughnessy.

Attendees are invited to bring their own memories for sharing during discussion time.

This program is the third in a series featuring the history of Columbus Catholic families whose endeavors have made their names familiar in the community. In earlier programs we have heard the stories of Irish Catholic politicians and Italian Catholic restaurateurs.

Important:

Bulletin Digital Publishing Proposal

There will be an important vote taken at the November meeting regarding the future of the monthly *Bulletin*.

At the Summer meeting we discussed the possibility of moving away from all-paper publishing of the *Bulletin*. The biggest change, allowing a smaller print run, would be that the free copy sent to each parish would be a digital version only, instead of paper. The reasons for this are:

- ◆ We can save money by reducing the print run from 320 to perhaps 140. (We currently distribute about 240 and print an extra 20 for the author and 60 for future binding and individual sales.)
- ◆ Our volunteers will have to handle only perhaps 70 paper copies each month instead of 240.
- ◆ The smaller number of paper copies can be mailed in envelopes. We will regain the last half page of each issue from the postal system and the copies will not have tape stuck to them.

Proposed member and subscriber rates:

- ◆ Basic membership - \$12 per household (less than the current \$15), includes digital Bulletin via e-mail
- ◆ Membership with paper Bulletin mailed first class - add \$13 for a total of \$25 per year
- ◆ Life membership - includes paper version
- ◆ Institutional subscription - unchanged at \$35 per year for a paper version

An announcement of the final decision will be mailed to members after the November meeting, with an application form for 2010 membership asking which Bulletin version is desired for 2010. This will include a personalized note for those who have already paid for 2010 or additional future years regarding those funds.

The plan is to mail the January, 2010 paper Bulletin as we have in the past. We will have to hear from members by January 5 whether they want to include a paper Bulletin in their 2010 membership, so we will know how many paper copies of the February and later issues to print.

It is proposed that the newsletter be distributed in the same manner as the Bulletin (digital or paper) and on our website, with meetings also continuing to be announced in the *Catholic Times*.

Bulletin Articles Wanted

It has been quite some time since we said so, but we are always open to considering articles for the Bulletin written by members or others. Although we plan ahead, several months in the second half of 2010 still lack lead articles.

Bound Volumes Available

A limited number of bound volumes of the *Bulletin* or the three-year period 2006-2008 are still available, at \$25 for members or subscribers, \$35 for all others.
